Any child with a disability who requires special education and related services and who has not graduated from high school is eligible to continue to receive a free appropriate public education until the end of the school year in which that child reaches the age of 22. (NC 1501-1.1)</p> <p>Eligibility</p> <p>Each LEA must conduct a full and individual initial evaluation (including progress monitoring data) in accordance with NC 1503-2.4 through NC 1503-2.7 before the initial provision of special education and related services to a child with a disability under these Policies.
