

#### LABOR TRAFFICKING

The recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for labor or services, through the use of force, fraud, or coercion for the purpose of subjection to involuntary servitude, peonage, debt bondage, or slavery.


# The Two Types

#### SEX TRAFFICKING

The recruitment, harboring, transportation, provision, or obtaining of a person for a commercial sex act induced by force, fraud, or coercion, OR in which person induced to perform such an act has not obtained 18 years of age.

### What Is Human Trafficking?








### Force

### Power, violence, compulsion, or constraint exerted upon or against a person or thing.



### Fraud

A false representation of a matter of fact—whether by words or by conduct, by false or misleading allegations, or by concealment of what should have been disclosed—that deceived and is intended to deceive so that the individual will act upon it to her or his legal injury.







### Coercion

The intimidation of a victim to compel the individual to do some act against his or her will by the use of psychological pressure, physical force, or threats.





### Forms of Force, Fraud, & Coercion

- Lack of mobility
- Debt bondage
- Document confiscation
- Recruitment fraud
- Lack of payment
- Long hours without reprieve
- Inability to walk away



### **NC Human Trafficking**



- In 2022 the state Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) Task Force received a total of 18, 873 Cybertips from the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children -a 48% increase from the year 2021. This is a 383% increase since 2019.
- NC convicts 100% of the federal sex trafficking defendants (with imprisonment).
- Analyzing 3 years of data exploring the impact of Commercial Sexual Exploitation of Children within Mecklenburg County found that 64% of identified minors since 2020 were 15 years old or younger.


In NC, human trafficking of an adult constitutes a Class F felony for cases with adult victims and a Class C felony for cases with child victims. Convictions carry sentences of jail time up to 19 years.

### **Trafficking & Homelessness**

#### **Youth Experiencing Homelessness**



The Modern Slavery Research Project's reported that homeless youth have higher rates of primary risk factors for trafficking such as poverty, unemployment, and a history of sexual abuse or mental health issues and that those aging out of the foster care system faced high rates of sex (18 percent) and labor (10 percent) trafficking.

### **Sex Trafficking of Boys and Young Men**

Researchers found that boys and young men are ignored,

underreported, and underserved for a number of reasons,

including the following:

Unwillingness of boys to self-identify as sexually exploited

due to shame and stigma

- Lack of appropriate screening and intake
- Limited outreach to areas and venues
- Oversimplification of the reality that boys are not generally



### **Identifying Trafficking: Risk Factors**


- History of abuse or neglect
- History of sexual abuse
- Family involvement in illicit or illegal activities
- History with child welfare system
- Lack of support system or safety net
- Few or no employment options
- Job history
- Lack of stable housing

- Poverty or lack of opportunities
- Untreated mental illness
- Low cognitive functioning and learning disabilities
- Relationship history
- Emotional reasoning
- Substance abuse or dependence
- Immigration status
- Identification as LGBTQ



### **Identifying Trafficking: Indicators**





### <u>Click to see</u> <u>the full</u> <u>infographic</u>

- Approached by a trafficker or engaged with people involved in trafficking
- Multiple sex partners
- Frequent travel to other cities or out of state
- Frequently seen at hotels/motels or other sites where commercial

- Exhaustion, depression, or symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder (PTSD)
- Poor physical health or malnourishment
- Physical trauma, such as scars or bruises
- Untreated medical issues, such

- Works but is unpaid, paid very little, or paid only through tips
- Accrues debt to employer while at work, or has responsibility for working off a large debt
- Recruited for work with promise of easy money
- Not allowed to quit a job




### **Mandatory Reporting**

- North Carolina has several laws that require any person
- to make a report when they suspect, reasonably believe,
- know, or have reason to know a person is a victim or
- survivor of human trafficking.





#### **Circumstances Requiring a Mandated Report**



A person who makes a report in good faith is immune from any civil or criminal liability, and good faith is presumed. G.S. 7B-309.




### **Case Examples**



- 1. In the course of working with a 17-year-old student, you discover that they are a victim of sex or labor trafficking. Do you have to make a report, and if so, to which agency do you report?
- 2. You work with an adult woman who discloses that her live-in partner has exchanged her 12-year-old child for drugs. Do you have to make a report, and if so, to which agency do you report?
- 3. You work with an adult survivor of human trafficking. The survivor discloses that they are aware of two juveniles who are currently being trafficked. Do you have to make a report, and if so, to which agency do you report?
