Sexual Orientation (Lesbian Gay Bisexual)







- How a person characterizes their sexuality
- "There are three distinct components of sexual orientation," said Ryan Watson, a professor of Human Development & Family Studies at the University of Connecticut. "It's comprised of identity (I'm gay), behavior (I have sex with the same gender) and attraction (I'm sexually attracted to the same gender), and all three might not line up for all people."

The term "sexual preference" is outdated as it implies someone's sexual orientation is a choice or could be easily changed.







Sex Assigned at Birth







- The label that doctors assign to an infant after examining external genitalia
- Attributes such as chromosomes present, internal and external genital and reproductive anatomy, and hormones can influence the assignment
 - Most common sex assignments are 'male' and 'female'
 - Many individuals do not find out they might be intersex until later in life









Gender Identity







- One's concept of self as man, woman, nonbinary or something else
- Gender identity may not align with sex assigned at birth
- NOT related to sexual orientation

Think of it as who you are in your own mind and heart







Cisgender







- Refers to someone whose gender identity matches the sex they were assigned at birth
- Helps name the unstated assumption that everyone's sex assigned at birth is congruent with their gender identity
- Preferred to "normal/real" because "normal/real" implies that transgender people are "abnormal/not real"
- The prefix "cis" means *on the same side as* (that is, the opposite of the prefix "trans")







Transgender







- A term used to describe a person whose sex assigned at birth and gender identity are incongruent, or do not "match"
 - Can include Transgender Man, Transgender Woman, Nonbinary and other genders that do not "match" what they were assigned at birth

Transgender Man	Transgender Woman
The affirming way to refer to a person who identifies as a man but was assigned female at birth	The affirming way to refer to a person who identifies as a woman but was assigned male at birth







Nonbinary







- A gender identity to describe someone that doesn't fit neatly into the "man" or "woman" boxes
 - The term 'nonbinary' can be an umbrella term for some
 - There are many labels people might use within the nonbinary spectrum
 - Genderfluid, Agender, Bigender, etc.
 - All depends on what label someone connects and identifies with







Gender Expression







- A person's outward presentation
- Usually comprised of personal style, clothing, hairstyle, makeup, jewelry, vocal inflection and body language
- Typically categorized as masculine or feminine, less commonly as androgynous
- May or may not be congruent with a person's gender identity

LGBTQ+ Youth Homelessness







LGBTQ+ Youth Homelessness







- 28% of LGBTQ+ youth reported experiencing homelessness or housing instability at some point in their lives
- 40% of homeless youth in the United States identify as LGBTQ+

LGBTQ+ Youth Homelessness







- Homelessness and housing instability were reported at higher rates among transgender and nonbinary youth
 - 38% of transgender girls
 - o 39% of transgender boys
 - 35% of nonbinary youth
 - All compared to 23% of cisgender Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Queer youth

Contributing Factors







Family Rejection

 Rejection or lack of acceptance based on gender identity and/or sexual orientation

Being Forced Out

 Coming out to parents/guardians resulting in getting forced out of the home







Contributing Factors







Violence and Discrimination

 Bullying and harassment in schools and communities creating unwelcoming and unsafe environments

Economic Instability

 Poverty and lack of access to resources and services, particularly those who have been rejected by their families







Challenges







Mental Health

 Up to 4x more likely to report depression, anxiety, self-harm, considering suicide, and attempting suicide compared to those with stable housing

Physical Health

 Increased vulnerability to physical health problems including substance abuse, STI's, and HIV/AIDS

Sexual Violence & Trafficking

- 7.4 times more likely to experience acts of sexual violence than heterosexual peers
- 56% of transgender youth are involved in the sex trade
- 1 in 3 LGBTQ+ youth are likely to be recruited within 48 hours of leaving home

6 Strategies for Affirming LGBTQ+ Youth

Believe Them

It is imperative that you and the young person are opening up to believe what they're saying.

Help Connect to Support & Resources

Helping to identify and connect to supportive resources can reduce their sense of isolation.

Validate & Empathize

Show that their feelings are valid and demonstrate empathy even if you do not understand.

Advocate

Advocacy is essential to ensuring that clients are safe, respected and affirmed while in your care

Use Affirming Name & Pronouns

One of the most effective ways to demonstrate affirmation.

Be Proactive

Being proactively prepared to support a LGBTQ+ youth will help you provide quality services and support when needed.

Systemic Change





 Increase access to affordable, high-quality, non-discriminatory health care services and insurance benefits for LGBTQ+ people. Protect and strengthen the civil rights of LGBTQ+ people engaged with the criminal legal system and law enforcement.



 Promote the economic security and financial stability of LGBTQ+ people by fostering inclusive labor practices and workplace policies. Ensure greater access to safe and stable housing for LGBTQ+ people, as well as support services for those experiencing homelessness.

 Foster inclusive, safe, welcoming, and affirming schools and educational environments for LGBTQ+ students. Support fair and humane treatment of LGBTQ+ immigrants, including by promoting the rights of LGBTQ+ people abroad.

Advocacy





Culturally Competent Services





Advocate for the implementation of culturally competent and inclusive support services that address the specific needs of LGBTQ+ homeless youth, including housing assistance, mental health counseling, and educational support

Community Support



Encourage community involvement and support, including volunteering, donating to LGBTQ+ youth organizations and programs, and promoting awareness and acceptance within local communities and schools
